

Foxtails

Annual grasses releasing foxtails grow quickly throughout the rainy season. As temperatures rise, the foxtail-shaped tip of each grass blade dries out and the individual awns ("A slender, bristle-like appendage found on the spikelets of many grasses.") take a ride on any passing object. The plant is engineered by nature to spread seed, and it is designed to *burrow further into an object with each movement*, making it a major problem for small animals.

There is no escape. The pesky seeds from these dried grasses get stuck everywhere. Many pet owners have heard the warnings about foxtails and know to avoid them as much as possible. What many do not know, however, is that foxtail migration can cause severe, and potentially deadly, consequences.

While foxtails are often caught in the fur and can be quickly removed, they can also migrate internally if left unfound through several common routes such as the nose, ears, and eyes. They can even penetrate through the skin or through a pet's genital openings. If these problematic hitch-hiking seeds find their way inside of a pet's body, they can cause many

serious problems. Once internalized, foxtails can wreak havoc on the body, causing internal abscesses and even infections of the bones around the spinal cord.

While foxtails aren't always easy to spot, their presence can be noticeable through various telltale symptoms, depending on their location in the body. Be mindful of the following symptoms during foxtail season:

- ◆ NOSE: violently sneezing and pawing at the nose, and sometimes a bloody nose.
- ◆ EYES: rubbing the eye, squinting and pain, excessive tearing or discharge, or an eye "glued shut."
- ◆ EARS: head tilt or violent shaking of the head from side to side, pain, discharge, or an eye odor.
- MOUTH/THROAT: gagging, loud coughing, difficulty swallowing (you will notice your pet having "exaggerated swallowing" movements, like when you have a sore throat), and possibly increased odor.
- ◆ PAWS: continuous licking of the paw or pad, or the appearance of a swollen "bubble" between the toes, or a small "hole" in the skin which is indicative of a draining tract, which is the path the foxtail is taking under the skin.
- ◆ UNDER SKIN: formation of sores or abscesses.

If any of these symptoms are noted, you should see your veterinarian immediately for a check-up. If a foxtail is found relatively superficially in the skin or nose, it can be removed rather simply. If a foxtail has moved into the lungs or deeply into the nose or genitals, an endoscope can be used for its location and removal.

An endoscopy involves the use of a high-tech instrument with a specialized video camera and small grabbing tools that can be passed through the mouth, nose, or rectum and is a lot less invasive than traditional surgical methods. However, if the foxtail has entered the belly or lungs, surgery is sometimes the only treatment possible.

While it's best to avoid areas where foxtails grow, if your pet has been exposed to the grass, make sure to brush their coat well, feel all over the body with your hands, and perform a thorough inspection of the ears, nose, between the toes and paw pads, and underneath the collar after each romp. It's important to learn about the dangers of this plant, take extra precautions, and remove foxtails immediately. Be overly cautious in foxtail season - dogs and their people deserve to enjoy a drama-free summer outdoors.

DIY Physical Exam: An "Owner's Manual" for Your Dog - PART II

NOSE

NORMAL:

Smooth, soft and clean; it is a misconception that a dry, warm nose means illness; sometimes a normal nose can appear slightly dry as well as warm to the touch; a healthy nose should feel like soft, supple leather, it is not necessarily always cool, wet and moist.

ABNORMAL:

- ♦ Excessively dry and cracked.
- Colored nasal discharge; a green, yellow, or white discharge generally indicates a bacterial infection (scant, clear, watery discharge can be normal).
- ♦ Bleeding.



EYES

NORMAL:

- Bright, centered between eyelid, pupils are equal in size.
- ♦ Whites of the eye should not appear colored (i.e. red or yellow) and should have a few visible blood vessels.
- ◆ Pupils should shrink equally when a bright light is shined into either eye and enlarge equally when the eyes are held closed or the room darkened (this is called a pupillary light reflex and is part of a neurological exam).

ABNORMAL:

- Squinting or tearing of the eyes: this can indicate an ulcer or cornea scratch - the cell layer covering the eye.
- ♦ The appearance of blood in the eye or "hyphema"; this can indicate exposure to rat bait or other causes of your pet's blood not being able to clot properly.
- ◆ Pupils fail to respond, or respond differently from one another, when a bright light is shined into either eye.

ABNORMAL:

- ◆ Dull, sunken eyes: this can indicate severe dehydration.
- ♦ Eyes that appear dry and "bloodshot" can indicate conditions such as uveitis, KCS ("dry eye'), severe dehydration, or other systemic illnesses.
- ♦ Thick discharge from eyes: a little grey "eye booger" in the morning is normal, as in people, but be concerned if you notice any discharge with green or yellow color to it.
- ♦ One/both eyes not centered: this can indicate a tumor or infection behind the eye, as well as other pathology.
- ♦ Pupils of unequal size: this can indicate head trauma, a possible tumor, or other neurologic problems.
- ♦ Abnormal colors that indicate problems are yellow (jaundice), or red (bloodshot); pay close attention to the color of the whites of your pet's eyes.

EARS

Chronic ear problems are common in pets, and are often a result of allergies to inhaled pollen (like hay fever in people) that are then complicated by secondary infections with bacteria or yeast. Ear infections can be painful and head shaking can lead to an accumulation of blood in the floppy part of the ear, known as an aural hematoma.

NORMAL:

- Skin smooth and without wounds.
- ♦Clean and dry.
- ♦ Almost odor-free.
- ◆Typical carriage for breed.
- ♦ Pain-free when you massage, especially at base of the ear.

ABNORMAL:

- Wounds, scabs, or any sign of rash.
- Crust, moisture, or other discharge in ear canal.
- Any strong odor.
- Atypical carriage for breed; for example, a droopy ear in a breed with normally erect ears.
- Painful or swollen ears.

MOUTH

NORMAL:

- ♦ Teeth are clean and white
- ♦ Gums are uniformly pink and moist to the touch (they should ♦ The gums are red: this can indicate severe dehydration, not feel dry or sticky).
- ◆ Capillary refill time (CRT): to assess, press on gum tissue with finger or thumb and release quickly; the part you just pushed on will turn white. Watch the color return to the gums - this is a crude assessment of how well the heart and circulatory system are working, and your pet's hydration status. A normal CRT is 1 - 1.5 seconds for the color to return; this can be difficult to interpret at times (for example, if your pet has dark or pigmented gums it should not be relied on as definitive evidence of illness or health.

ABNORMAL:

- ♦ Tartar accumulation around the base of the teeth
- shock, heat stroke, or sepsis (severe infection in the body).
- Gums are bluish or purple: indicates inadequate oxygen; this can be noted with lung disease, heart disease, or any disease that impairs proper oxygen to the body.
- ♦ Pale gums: due to lack of blood or shock possible causes are internal bleeding (such as a mass on a spleen suddenly rupturing and bleeds - very common in old dogs), trauma or shock (hit by a car). And immune mediated diseases.
- Gums that have little bruises: known as petechiation and generally seen with rat bait toxicity or other problems with the body's ability to clot the blood.
- ◆ Gums are inflamed, "spongy" looking, or appear sore.
- ♦ A sluggish CRT, or dry and sticky gums

The majority of us own a smart phone, or an iPod, but have you ever explored your apps on your modern day info-tech? When I typed in "canine" on my search apps on my Droid cell phone, I had over a thousand hits - from games, photos, first aid, health, rescue, wallpapers, food, recipes, special breeds, quizzes, to virtual dogs, etc. To refine the search, I typed "Canine Health" and had only 469 results. Scrolling through 469 hits was an interesting journey. From pet health, organizers, rescues, first aid, books, and puzzles, there is a world of information. I estimate about 80% of these are free. I have broken down some of them to help you find the perfect app for you.

PET FIRST AID: There are quite a few of them out there and many are in a book format.

- ◆ Dog Care / Free: takes a while to download.
- ◆ Pet First Aid / \$2.99: Info on emergencies like bleeding, choking, drowning. Teaches rescue breathing. What to do for bites and stings, bloat and torsion. Detailed videos and step by step illustrations.
- ◆ Pet Tech-Pet Saver / \$4.99: Book form but easy to use and access chapters. Dental care, essentials, CPR & First Aid.
- ◆ Natural Dog Health / \$1.05: Natural health for your dog fleas, ticks, arthritis, allergies and dental.

FOOD:

- ◆ Dog Food Guide / \$1.36: What's really in pet food, how it's made, labeling, BARF & RAW diets, kibble, canned etc. This is an eye opener.
- Hypoallergenic Dog Food: Explains what hypoallergenic dog food is and why it works; cooking tips; has a direct web site "Dog Food Adviser" for more info.
- ♦ Dog Food Info / Free: Concerned with what is safe to feed dogs; helps owners everywhere to answer food safety questions and provides descriptions on why certain food or plants are safe or unsafe for dogs to eat.
- ◆ Dog Raw Diet Calculator / \$6.11: Interesting raw dishes; first dog diet calculator ever; helps balance a diet for your dog; calories, number of meals, protein, fat, carbohydrates, calcium, etc.; weekly shopping list.

TRAINING:

- ◆ Certified Veterinary Assistant / \$2.89: A guide to prepare you to be a Veterinary Assistant, Technician and Animal caregiver.
- ◆ Animal Anatomy & Physiology / \$1.89: Prep guide for animal care training; teaches with quizzes, flash cards and dictionary.
- ♦ How To Groom Your Dog / \$1.99: Tips on grooming your pet; videos can be add if requested.
- ◆ Train Your Show Dog / \$.99: Training, nutrition, types of dog shows, what goes on, etc.
- ◆ Dog Trainers Quotes / Free: Local news, books, seminars, videos in training, articles and photos.

ORGANIZERS: These are only as good as the info you put in them.

- ◆ Pet Pal, Pet Manager / \$1.98: Pet organizer with important social options; keeps all pets' details well organized; stores and tracks vital details and info.; emergency numbers, photos, reminders for your pet agenda, Google maps with vet clinics, pet stores, groomers, parks, and trainers.
- ♦ Pet Planners / Free: Enter pet's info Reg. #, nickname, date of birth, gender, breed, colour, chip #, sire and dam name, insurance # and photo; add medical records, weight, vet visits; it will remind you when your next visit is due.
- ◆ My Pet Record / Free: Creates reminders for your next Vet visit.

ALL IN ONE:

- ◆ Caring For Your Dog / Free: Book format; understanding ingredients, feeding, cost of feeding, dry vs. canned food, food allergies; signs of ill health; fleas, parasites, dental care, vaccinations, insurance and bathing.
- ◆ Dog Care Tips / Free: Tips on grooming, training and pet care; info. on ophthalmology, dermatology and neurology, oncology, etc. It explains each job description and how to look for a reputable one; blogs on herbs for dogs, herbal remedies, bacterial condition, antibiotics, YouTube videos on How to ..massage, treat mange, brush your dog's teeth, etc.
- ◆ Pet Care All About Dogs / Free: Provides info. on various breeds from training to health care, adoptions tips, etc.
- ◆ Caring for Aging Dogs / \$.99: Exercise, medical and how to get ready to say good-bye.

FUN:

- ◆ Pet Camera / Free: Take a photo of your pet, decorate it with special borders and share them with the rest of the network.
- ◆ **Dog Talk:** Talk into the phone, then press a breed and it barks back.
- ◆ Dog Lover Quotes / Free: Just quotes about dogs.
- ◆ All Dogs / Free: A list of a lot of breeds, basic description, health and history.
- ◆ Best Dog Names / Free: In all languages.

GENERAL:

- Pet Insurance Review / Free: Several different types of insurance, insurance coverage, lots of reading.
- ◆ HeLP Lost & Adoptable Pets / Free: Must log-in at www.helpinglostpets.com; list of adoptable pets in your area as well as a list of lost; can take a snap shot of a missing dog poster and post it.
- Pet Ching / Free: Daily pet deals from suppliers, sitters and walkers; also a lost and found section.

These were just a few samples of all the wonderful apps out there.
Have fun searching for that perfect app!

Durham Kennel Club Health Clinic Heart Testing* & OFA Certifications (More info. about OFA at: www.offa.org)

The all-breed health clinics sponsored by the DKC provide a fabulous service to the dogloving community. Last year 8 IWAMS hounds had vital health tests done for lower costs. Heart disease is a leading cause of death in Irish Wolfhounds due to a small gene pool and specific cardiac

abnormalities. Early detection and treatment can add time to your dog's life. Testing helps the Irish Wolfhound Foundation (IWF) and the Orthopedic Foundation for Animals (OFA) further their studies of breed-specific issues. Hounds must be at least 2 years of age for heart testing. The clinic offers OFA Eye, Cardiac Auscultation, Echocardiograms (requires an appointment), BAER,

Position Descriptions from the Bylaws:


Section 4.02 Officers

The Club's Officers, consisting of the President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer shall serve in their respective capacities both with regard to the Club and its meetings and the Board and its meetings. Officers shall serve without compensation, but they may receive recompense for reasonable out-of-pocket costs advanced on behalf of the Club upon approval by the Board.

- (a) The President shall preside at all meetings of the Club and of the Board, and shall have the duties and powers normally appurtenant to the office of President in addition to those particularly specified in these bylaws and/or required by law.
- (b) The Vice President shall have the duties and exercise the powers of the President in case of the President' death, absence or incapacity.
- (c) The Secretary shall keep a record of all meetings and activities of the Club and of the Board and of all matters of which a record shall be ordered by the Club. The Secretary shall have charge of the all correspondence, notifying members of meetings, notifying new members of their election to membership, notifying officers and directors of their election to office, keeping a roll of the members of the Club with their addresses, and carrying out such other duties as are prescribed in these bylaws.
- (d) The Treasurer shall collect and receive all moneys due or belonging to the Club. Moneys shall be deposited in a bank designated by the Board, in the name of the Club. The books shall at all times be open to inspection by the Board and a report shall be given at every meeting on the condition of the Club's finances and every item of receipt or payment not before reported.

New board members are voted on at our annual meeting on November 9. It would be great to have the entire region from Virginia to South Carolina represented on the board.
